#### THE IMPORTANCE OF SCHOOL ATTENDANCE AND ARRIVING ON TIME

Encouraging regular school attendance is one of the most powerful ways you can prepare your child for success-both in school and in life. When you make school attendance a priority, you help your child get better grades, develop healthy life habits.

When students are absent for fewer days, their grades and reading skills often improve-even among those students who are struggling in school. Students who attend school regularly also feel more connected to their school, develop important social skills and friendships. But when kids are absent for an average of just two days of school per month-even when absences are excused-it can have a negative impact. These absences can affect students as early as Kindergarten.

For example, young elementary school students who miss an average of just two school days per month often have difficulty keeping up with their peers academically and tend to fall behind in reading. But when students are able to read on grade level by the end of third grade, which is when students transition from *learning to read to reading to learn*, they are three to four times more likely to graduate high school and attend college, post-graduate, or professional development classes that their peers who struggle with reading.
 Parents, please make every effort to get your child to school on time each and every day. Any child who arrives after 8:05 is marked absent.
